1. Influence local policy







How to exercise your powers

1. Influence local policy
2. Help manage development
 1. Comment upon planning applications
 2. Suggest 'planning obligations'
 3. Contribute to pre-application consultation by developers - make sure they know you are there, in a positive and proactive way.

How to exercise your powers

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 - Contribute to pre-application consultation
3. Make suggestions re sites
4. Contribute to local authority's own projects e.g. Kingston public space redevelopment.

In a positive and non-adversarial way!

Key Moves

1. Know your rights, and be ready to exercise them responsibly.
2. Know your local policy, good and bad.
3. Think proactively and constructively about what you would like to see delivered.
